2. CRRA Data Collection on the Value of the Portal

CRRA Liaisons, Collections, DAC and Scholars committees have developed a survey designed to better understand scholars' use of Catholic research resources and to explore what is unique and important about the Portal, where is it duplicative, and how it might be improved and made more relevant or useful.

The survey is intended to be shared with current and prospective Portal users by CRRA members. In order to assist member institutions in collecting data locally, a short video presentation of the portal accompanies the survey. The questionnaire is short with open and closed questions specific to the goals. The survey will remain open until June 1, 2017.

4. University of Notre Dame

4a. University of Notre Dame's Hesburgh Libraries is excited to host Professor Kyle Roberts, Loyola University of Chicago, who will speak on "21st Century Digital Approaches to Rethinking 19th Century Catholic Print", Thursday June 1, 2017 at 2:00pm (EDT), in the Rare Books and Special Collections. Professor Roberts talk is in conjunction with the launch of a digital exhibit counterpart to the physical exhibit, *"Preserving the Steadfastness of Your Faith": Catholics in the Early American Republic*", on view in Rare Books and Special Collections through August 11, 2017. The online exhibit will be available at *rarebooks.library.nd.edu* by June 1.

4b. University of Notre Dame is launching a new research tool called *Convocate*. This launch is the culmination of three years of project partnership between the Hesburgh Libraries and the Center for Civil and Human Rights and is a great example of the ways that the Libraries shape and help to implement campus research and digital projects. *Convocate* is an innovative

database and research tool that positions Notre Dame at the forefront of research into connections between international human rights law and Catholic social teaching. Initial database documents in international human rights come from the United Nations, the International Labour Organization, and the African Union, among others — those that focus on Catholic social teaching are from the Vatican and the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops.

The 2017 Texas Conference on Digital Libraries (TCDL) will take place at the Commons Learning Center (CLC) on the J.J. Pickle Research Campus in Austin, Texas on May 23-25, 2017. The CLC is within walking distance of the Texas Advanced Computing Center and near the pedestrian-friendly Domain Austin, featuring more than 100 stores, restaurants, and hotels. TCDL covers topics relevant to the creation, promotion, and preservation of research, scholarship, and cultural heritage digital materials. The goal of TCDL is to bring together those working on digital projects -- including outreach librarians, repository managers, catalogers, faculty members, technical staff, and others -- in order to build a practical, usable, and sustainable model for digital libraries.
